#### What General Studies degrees are available?

- · Associate of Science (AS)
- Associate of Arts (AA) (requires proficiency in a foreign language or American Sign Language at the 1020 level)

#### What is the content of a General Studies degree?

The primary content is General Education, the purpose of which is to provide you with foundational knowledge and skills that enhance and transcend your academic program of study.

#### Why choose General Studies at WSU?

- Through General Education classes, you may discover an interest in a more specific major.
- If you have completed a number of General Education courses, you
  may have already completed many of the degree requirements.
- Some students can complete a General Studies associate's degree within two years. By earning at least 15 credits each semester, you will complete your degree in less time and for less money than students taking fewer credits per semester.
- The entire degree can be earned through online classes.
- For some (not all) bachelor's degrees, General Studies is a great way to "lock in" General Education coursework, so consult an academic advisor to inquire if this associate's degree is right for you.
- Some competitive college programs grant extra points towards admission to applicants who have earned an associate's degree.
- Other universities within the Utah State Higher Education System (USHE) will accept a WSU General Studies associate's degree to fulfill the General Education requirements of their bachelor's degrees.

#### What are the employment opportunities?

- The highly transferable knowledge and skills gained from this degree are strongly desired by employers in many different settings.
- Some employment positions require that you have an associate's degree to be hired or to earn a promotion.
- The U.S. Department of Labor's Bureau of Statistics reports that associate's degree graduates earn an average of approximately \$7,000 more a year than people with only a high school diploma. They also report that the 2013 unemployment rate for people with an associate's degree was 5.4% compared to 7.5% for those with only a high school diploma.

- Minimum 2.0 WSU GPA
